# All Hazard exercise tests quick response

U.S. Army Garrison Livorno tests its emergency response capabilities by conducting an annual Force Protection exercise Oct. 23. The exercise began with a simulated train derailment at the Livorno Army Depot, which escalated into a hazardous cloud of toxic fumes that threatened the garrison workforce.

The first responders arrived quickly to the scene and wounded were brought to the triage area. Luckily this was only the scenario of a force protection exercise according to Linn Weaver, Director of Plans, Training, Mobilization and Security (DPTMS).

Meanwhile, an Emergency Operation Center (EOC) was established immediately on Camp Darby, and a triage area was organized at the Livorno Health Clinic. According to Weaver, the EOC and triage area are critical elements during emergencies in order for the Command to organize its efforts to minimize or stop the threat to the public health or safety, as well as treat those that have been injured.

Suddenly, the scenario called for a wind change that simulated the toxins blowing in the direction of Camp Darby,

which posed a new threat to the personnel in the vicinity of the contaminated area.

This prompted a reaction from the EOC and the on-scene commander to further contain the area, as well as having them organize the evacuation of more casualties that happened to be working the area that became contaminated.

"This annual exercise is a great opportunity to test the efficiency of internal procedures," said Col. Raffaele Iubini, Italian Base Commander, "it is also a chance to interact with our local emergency responder counterparts".

"This training is something we look forward to," added Maj. Gregory

# 497th Provides support at Forward Operating Base Bastion

Soldiers and equipment from the 497th Movement Control Team have been called upon to assist the 2/7 Marines at Forward Operating Base Bastion with the movement of containers in support of routine operations. This is no small undertaking as it requires the RTCH to be reduced to transport configuration in order to be loaded on a C-17 aircraft.

This is the first time that Sgt. Dahlback has had the opportunity to prepare and transport a RTCH for shipment, even though he is a Cargo Specialist by military occupational speciality. He was assisted by mechanics from KBR Maintenance who helped and taught him how to reconfigure the RTCH.

Sgt. Dahlback took the lead as the senior RTCH operator with the assistance of Pfc. Ngirarois for this mission. He was responsible for the movement of containers thru-out the FOB Bastion area with the upcoming 2/7 Marines redeployment.

Missions such as this are not new to the 497th MCT as it supports numerous FOBs in the RC-South area of operations.

Iverson, Commander, Livorno Health Clinic, “it’s great training for our medics to renew their trauma setting skills.”

Livorno Health Clinic newcomer, Dr. Ray German said “this exercise is critically important; I am really impressed on how well this one was organized, and how the delegation of responsibilities was effective and timely.”

The collaboration with local authorities is crucial in case of real emergency; according to Weaver.

“The active participation of the Prefecture, Civil Protection, the 118 first aid, the Red Cross, and the Italian Fire Department was a big plus for us to better understanding their procedures,” explained Weaver. “Their professionalism, quick response and knowledge is excellent.”

“The flux of information was very realistic between the exercise site and the EOC,” said Iubini. “The effective communication highlighted the perfect integration between the local authorities responsible for the emergency measures, and the military authorities which were involved in the first phase of immediate response to a disaster.”

The Army is aware, however, that a requirement that all domestic abuse allegations be reported can represent a barrier for victims who want assistance without command or law enforcement involvement.

Since April 2006 the Army has offered adult victims of domestic violence the option of unrestricted reporting or restricted reporting. Please know that restricted reporting of domestic abuse can be made to: Victim Advocates, the Victim Advocate Supervisor, Chaplains, Healthcare providers and FAP Clinical Social Workers.

Nurturing a healthy relationship takes lots of work, commitment and compromise. In October, let the Family Advocacy Program give you some new insights and ideas to help maintain your strong and cooperative relationship.

In coordination with the Run to the Tower on October 17, spectators and runners were asked to

## 2009 Scholarships for Military Children Program opens Nov. 3

FORT LEE, Va. – Scholarship applications will be available beginning Nov. 3 in commissaries worldwide and online through a link at <https://www.commissaries.com> and directly at <http://www.militaryscholar.org>.

The program kickoff each year in November coincides with National Military Family Month, and the scholarships are a great way for commissaries to get involved with the community and demonstrate support for the contributions of military families.

According to Defense Commissary Agency Director and Chief Executive Officer Philip E. Sakowitz Jr., the program has awarded more than \$6.4 million in scholarships to more than 4,000 of the best and brightest children of military families since the program began in 2001.

“We know that education is the key to a better future,” Sakowitz explained, “and we’re thrilled to be a part of something that makes it a little more affordable for military families.”

Commissaries are known for the savings they provide authorized customers who shop regularly – savings averaging 30 percent or more. In fact, commissaries have always sold groceries at cost, allowing them to pass a substantial savings on to their customers. The scholarship program is emblematic of DeCA’s commitment to improving the quality of life of America’s service members and their families by making military paychecks go further in today’s uncertain economy. The program awards \$1,500 scholarships to well-rounded, accomplished children of military families, meaning these families don’t have to dig as deep into their pockets to pay for tuition.

Only dependent, unmarried children (under the age 23) of active duty personnel, reserve/guard and retired military members,



survivors of service members who died while on active duty or survivors of individuals who died while receiving retired pay from the military may apply for a scholarship. Eligibility is determined using the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System database. Applicants should ensure that they, as well as their sponsor, are enrolled in the DEERS database and have a current ID card. The applicant must be planning to attend, or already be attending, an accredited college or university full time in the fall of 2009, or be enrolled in a program of studies designed to transfer directly into a four-year program.

Applicants should prepare to submit an essay on the following topic: “What would you place inside a time capsule to help people in the next century understand military life today?” Applications must be turned in to a commissary by close of business on Feb. 18, 2009. At least one scholarship will be awarded at every commissary location with qualified applicants.

Every dollar donated to the program by manufacturers, brokers and suppliers that sell groceries in commissaries, and the public at large goes directly to funding the scholarships. Fisher House Foundation underwrites the cost of administering the program, which is handled by Scholarship Managers, a national, nonprofit, scholarship management services organization.

### Flu Season is here

The 08/09 Flu Season is here and the Influenza vaccine has arrived at U.S Army Health Clinic Livorno.

The flu vaccine is recommended for all individuals 6 months and older; however, those at particularly high risk from influenza are: those 6 months to 3 years, those over 65, pregnant women, and those with diabetes or chronic breathing conditions such as reactive airway disease, asthma, or emphysema.

FluMist®, an intranasal vaccine approved for 2-49 year olds, is available for all Active duty members and school age children. It is a live, but weakened, influenza vaccine sprayed into the nose.

Injectable vaccine, an inactivated virus vaccine may be used for those with medical conditions that preclude the use of FluMist®, such as pregnancy, certain allergies or where intranasal vaccine is unavailable. Pediatric injectable vaccine will be administered to children ages 6-23 months. Injectable vaccine will also be administered to beneficiaries over 49 years old and those

patients for whom FluMist® has not been recommended.

Studies have shown that both the injectable vaccine and the nasal spray vaccine are both equally safe and effective at preventing influenza.

Vaccination is mandatory for all U.S. active duty military personnel, DoD civilians designated as emergency essential and reserve personnel on active duty.

You do not need an appointment but we request that you be mindful of the following hours as a walk-in for vaccinations. Mon, Tues, Wed and Fri from 8 a.m.-11 a.m. and 1 p.m.-3:30 p.m. and Thur 1 p.m.-3:30 p.m.

If you have any questions regarding the flu vaccination, please call central appointments at 633-7357.

The Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta publishes guidelines for influenza vaccinations, and the Army will follow those guidelines in its annual campaign. ## Fight Germs and Stay Healthy

### If you have a cold or flu:

#### Avoid close contact when possible

- ▶ Germs are transmitted by sneezing, coughing and even while speaking

#### Cover your cough or sneeze

- ▶ Use a tissue or your sleeve to cover your mouth and nose while coughing or sneezing
- ▶ Throw used tissue in the trash

### Wash your hands often

- ▶ Always wash your hands before eating and after using the latrine
- ▶ Wash hands for at least 15-20 seconds with warm, soapy water or alcohol-based gel

### Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth

- ▶ Germs are often spread when people touch something contaminated with germs (for example, other people's hands or smooth surfaces) and then touch their own eyes, nose or mouth






